To all of the members of the IAGSDC:



The Square dance clubs of Denver, The C.G.R.A. and the Denver Tavern Guild are to be complimented on their fine square dance convention and rodeo.

In questioning our members about the con-

vention, it is the general consensus that the convention was GREAT. Denver is to be commended for their effort. We particulary enjoyed the opportunity to get together with the many friends that we made at the convention last year. We also enjoyed not having to do the work. Some of our more advanced members felt that there was not enough open dancing during the mornings and afternoons. Since the Dance rooms were available with sound systems on a 24 hour basis, this really should not have been a problem. We would recommend that for future conventions open dances be scheduled (by program) during the day for those who do not wish to participate in any of the workshops. Also we would like to see intensive DBD, mainstream and plus workshops directed toward mainstream and plus dancers wishing to increase their proficiency level. Our members who attended Al, A2 and Cl workshops wanted more and longer sessions. We also would like to see a 2-step workshop. Charlies was a new experience for many of our dancers and a 2-step workshop would have helped them enjoy it even more than they did. Some of us needed no workshop for what we were at Charlies for.

Both of these terms were used in Denver and were seemingly used interchangeably...but I don't want to seem overly critical as it was the best square dance convention I have EVER attended in my 17 years of square dancing.

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ITEMS TO BE DISCUSSED IN FUTURE NEWSLETTERS

Hope you all read the letter from Hank Stack of the Rosetown Ramblers in Portland. Or. Convention committee take note.

Most of the clubs wished to discuss the need for money to run the Association seperate from the convention committees.

Adoption of standing rules or policy statements that will make our bylaws work--Example, new membership applications.

BANNERS Whose can be hung at a convention and the need for fireproofing.

Incorporation of our Association.

All clubs have indicated a desire for uniform styling. One or two calls per newsletter, perhaps a regular column.

Profits from future conventions.

Losses from future conventions.

Association historian.

Anyone have any ideas for putting c omputers to work for the Asssn.

Many clubs wish to have a record information exchange. This could include label, number, level, caller and song versus hash.

Exchange of information as to how various clubs handle dues and membership requirements.

Various arrangements clubs have for getting callers.

Where do we dance, rented halls, bars, etc. and the merits of each.

How do we handle our fundraisers.

Resources available to members wishing to learn to call.

How agressive we are as a club in participating in straight square dance functions.

What to do if we learn that one of our clubs discriminates against any minorities, women or straights.

Assemble information to produce a guideline for producing a convention. This could be a project by the cities with experience to help those cities who have that planning still ahead.

List of available music resources.

Establishing program committees. These would be of great help to a city planning a convention.

Club orginazation guidelines to help new clubs.

Sound systems.

Since much of our time is taken with the bylaws our next newsletter will only cover two of the above items. Need for money to run the Assn and Styling. For the next letter we will only discuss one call, and that will be "Weave the Ring". This is your chance to let your views be known so don'be shy. We really need everyone's input.

Any number of the above questions could be handled by a volunteer or a club and probably produce great results. If anyone wishes to take care of any items just let us know so that we don't duplicate your efforts.

Some members of the Portland, Oregon Rose Town Ramblers have developed what is an answer to the problem of how to include deaf dancers. Three of the members, faced with deaf man wanting to participate in the beginners' class last fall, decided to devise a sign code which would enable him to participate. The signs had to be made with one hand, be based on American Sign Language and easy to execute and remember. The result is a collection of signs which someone in the square or standing outside the square can use to inform the deaf dancer as to the calls announced. Of course, others in the square can and do pick up the more common signs and use them to make the calls even more visible.

The signs are linked to "key" words or phrases which can also be mouthed for those who have speechreading skills.

The booklet of signs which was shown to interested participants at the Denver convention is in the process of being revised — and if there is enough interest in the idea of involving deaf people in this activity, a workshop at a future convention is a possibility.
