

The response to Article IV of the by-laws was mostly in favor of leaving it as it is. Those who answered were mostly concerned with interpertation of the article as it now is. In next months newsletter we will cover Article V.

WEAVE THE RING

According to the letters and phone calls I recieved concerning this subject, by far the most popular was to perform the call using callerlab definition, using no hands. Second choice was to let the club or clubs hosting the convention determine the style and inform everyone several months prior to the convention. The third choice submitted by New York is "Viva La Difference" Most clubs will probably do it in the style that is most fun for them and it would be very hard to force any club to change. My suggestion is that all callers and teachers try to teach and enforce the callerlab style especially for a few months prior to convention. It won't hurt any of us to comply with this style for the duration of the convention.

Bill Eyler reports the Wilde Bunch's Festival at the time of the Int'l balloon Festival was a success and plans are already in the works for next years "Allemande the Rio Grande" on the same weekend. The Wilde Bunch dances on Wednesdays and Sundays and invite all who are passing through New Mexico to join them. They also report that they are very pleased to have about one fourth of their dancers women.

PHOENIX

The Desert Valley Squares and the Midnight Ramblers held a car wash for a fundraiser for their 1988 convention. They hope to raise \$10,000 in the next three years. They also had their first hoedown with a straight caller. From now to the end of the year both clubs in Phoenix will be busy with fundraisers and dance parties. HISTORY OF IAGSDC

On the weekend of February 12-13, 1983 the South Florida Mustangs had invited several other gay square dance clubs from around the country to a fly-in. During the weekend it was discussed and a decision was made to have two representatives from each club form some kind of a national organization. On Monday evening this group got togather on the patio of the Crossfire in Hollywood, Fl. and formed a group then called "The National association of gay and lesbian square dance clubs". The representatives at this meeting were; Mile High Squares, Denver, Colorado; Craig Mc Carthy and Bob Sutherland. South Florida Mustangs, Hollywood, Florida; Dean Hofmann and Ken Di Genova. Western Star Dancers, San Francisco, California; Ron Douglas and Scott Carey. The Puddletown Squares Seattle, Washington; Art Smith and Jim Goeres.

Also because the <u>New Years Resolutions</u> of Southern California had been in on the discussions about forming a group They were considered a founding member even though they had no representation at the first meeting in Florida.

Later on in the same year (1983) there was a meeting of the founding members of the association in Reno, Nevada at the National Gay Rodeo. A draft of the first by-laws was prepared there and each club took them home to discuss prior to coming to the first annual convention to be held in Seattle, Washington the following spring.

The other clubs throughout the nation were asked by mail to join our organization and those responding with applications prior to and during the 1984 convention in Seattle were;

These clubs togather with the <u>founding members</u> would be considered <u>charter members</u> of the Association.

At the same time in Reno a banner for the newly named "International Association of Gay Square Dance Clubs" was designed and presented. I believe credit for this goes to Dennis Fiken of the Western Star Dancers. This design was accepted as the logo for the association. Also at this time Harlan Kerr of Seattle, Wa. was elected the first chairman of the Association.

At the first annual convention in Seattle in the spring of 1984 a meeting was held by the representatives of the Assn. member clubs at which the agenda for the general meeting was discussed. At the general meeting the by-laws were ratified and the Mile High Squares of Denver made a bid for the 1985 convention. The bid made by Denver was accepted by the membership.

Later on in 1984 at the Rocky Mountain Regional Rodeo in Denver the executive board of the Assn. held a meeting. At this meeting Bud Rhyne of the Rocky Mountain Rainbeaus and the Mile High Squares was elected chairman of the Assn. for the following Year.

This short history brings us up to the time of the second annual convention in Denver in the spring of 1985. Listed below are the individuals who were in Miami at the time that this organization was formed.
