


Puddletown Dancers is the umbrella organization for the three Seattle square dance clubs: Puddletown Squares, the mainstream and plus club; Doppler Dancers, the advanced club; and BOQ, the challenge club. Lesbian and gay square dancing began in Seattle in 1982 with 57 people dancing. In January, 1983, 40 dancers joined Portland to kick off their new square dance group; and we've been dancing ever since.

Puddletown Squares formed in time for the first convention, ALL JOIN HANDS. As the club grew and dancers developed higher aspirations, the advanced and challenge level clubs formed. Puddletown Squares graduates between three and four mainstream squares and two plus squares each year. In 1992, Doppler Dancers held the first A class with a live caller. Two new squares joined Doppler Dancers from that class! If you want to know what BOQ stands for, just ask one of us who has on the badge. This club has expanded from Challenge Basic (C1) to include the Challenge Extended (C2) and Challenge Advanced (C3). BOQ hosted the first gay advanced/challenge fly-in and look forward to hosting the 1995 Challenge Fly-In for a 10th Anniversary celebration! Doppler Dancers & BOQ joined IAGSDC



Western Star Dancers, one of the founding members of the IAGSDC, was organized in March, 1982. We're a mainstream and plus level club, balancing a lively schedule of classes, social activities, and frequent weekend hoe-downs.


Western Star Dancers were the proud organizers of the 1986 STAR THROUGH THE GOLDEN GATE convention.

South Florida Mustangs began in January of 1977. Michael Straight and the staff of the Double-R Bar placed an ad in David Magazine which invited everyone to a square dance. Only enough for one set assembled that first night. By the following week there were two sets and a short time after, there were three. By Halloween of that same year we felt and thought we were really good, so we had our first Costume Square Dance Ball. About this

time, each set had a sponsor. Set #1, The Double-R, Set #2 The Club Baths and Set #3 Uncle Charles. We danced weekly at The Double-R the next three years. The bar remodeled and left us with no room for dancing, so for quite awhile we danced in various bars, the homes of members and in garages.

In 1980, we began dancing at The Villanova, a bar in Hollywood, Florida. This also was the year we voted on and accepted our present name. In the fall of 1981, we made our first big trip. We travelled to Houston, Texas, and danced at Miss Charlotte's, The Exile, and at Brazo River Bottom. In the spring of 1982, we travelled to Denver, Colorado, to again dance with The Mile High Squares. Our reception in Denver will never be forgotten, many lasting friendships were made and never lost. Later in the year, we attended The Reno Gay Rodeo and danced for the first time with groups from San Francisco, Sacramento and Denver. In February of 1983, The Crossfire Bar opened to become our home and where we sponsored The First Annual Square Dance Fly-In. At this event The National Association of Gay Square Dancers Club was formed. Now in our 17th year, we dance annually at The Gay and Lesbian Pride Festival and at various exhibitions throughout the year. You can find us dancing at The Round-Up Dance Hall (formerly The Crossfire Barn and IAGSDC home) to the incredible calling of our very own Chris Phillips. Dancing in all levels through C takes place on Sunday and Monday nights.

Capital City Squares was originally organized in 1981 by a group wishing to learn a few set dances. Capital City Squares quickly evolved into a club teaching basic and mainstream level square dancing. By 1986, the club had expanded to include plus level to keep up with the members' needs. Over the years, CCS has participated in many events, ranging from The Los Angeles Court Coronation and The Gay Rodeo in Reno, to The Gay Games in San Francisco, and numerous events in and around Sacramento. Most recently, the club has par-



ticipated in performances with The Sacramento Men's Chorus.

Capital City Squares has greatly expanded its activities over the past 12 years. The most popular event is the annual retreat, with a weekend of dancing and fun somewhere outside Sacramento. 1993 marks our fourth year at Fifes On The Russian River. As well as the retreat, CCS sponsors monthly dances, occasional guest callers on class night, workshops, and potlucks. Members of the club regularly participate in events in the local straight square dance community; this is often reciprocated at our events by curious folks, who, once they see our enthusiasm, return for more. Indeed, virtually every caller we have hired has requested a return performance. In addition, Capital City Squares enjoys the support of members from the gay clubs in the greater San Francisco Bay Area, expanding our circle of friends immeasurably.

Sixty some dancers (and "widows") keep the excitement high and the dancing fast and furious. As well as our own activities, club members regularly attend events sponsored by other clubs, in California and across the U.S. and Canada, and we have been well represented at every IAGSDC Convention since (and including) the first one in Seattle. Capital City Squares is currently represented on the '96 IAGSDC Convention Committee. We are busy; we do enjoy exposure!

Capital City Squares welcomes any and all to dance with us when you're in the area. We dance every Tuesday evening. Contact us for upcoming events and schedules.

DC Lambda Squares will celebrate its 11th anniversary in September. DC Lambda Squares was founded in 1982 with the help of IAGSDC historian Lou Torres. This spring, 37 new mainstream graduates brought our club membership to well over 120 dancers. A busy 1992-93 season saw us dancing four nights a week, which included classes for plus and advanced dancers as well as weekend socials with our friendly Baltimore neighbor, The Chesapeake Squares.



As host of the July 1994 IAGSDC convention, STARS AND SQUARES FOREVER, we've also been busy organizing and fund-raising. The March On Washington Dance drew more than 330 dancers from across the U.S. and Canada, one of our best fund raisers to date. Mark your calendar now for October 1-3 because STARS AND SQUARES FOREVER is co-hosting a Square Dance Rodeo/Fly-In with the Atlantic States Gay Rodeo Association.

"Pink Triangles in Red Square" First Stop, Seattle

This coming August 16, a planeload of square-dance goodwill ambassadors from all corners of the United States will travel to Russia for what will most likely be a oncein-a-lifetime, memory-creating journey.


This idea started nearly two years ago in San Francisco. The Enthusiasm for this "working vacation" soon spread to dancers in Seattle, Florida, New York, Colorado, Chicago, Cleveland, Virginia and beyond. In all, about 35 dancers will make the trek to the former Soviet Union.

Over the course of the two weeks, dancers will visit St. Petersburg, Moscow and Riga, Latvia. Approximately 2-4 interpreted, learn-to-square-dance events will be held for the gay and lesbian communities in each city. The contacts in the communities have shown lots of excitement and interest, which has really fueled the team to create a memorable event for everyone concerned

Officially named "Pink Triangles in Red Square," this adventure will begin with a Saturday morning breakfast during the REMAKE THE CIRCLE convention in Seattle. Because many of the travelers will attend the convention, it made sense to gather for the first time in such an energized atmosphere.

Actual time and place of the breakfast will be forthcoming, or look on bulletin boards during the convention for this information. Desert Valley Squares (DVS), Arizona's Premier Gay and Lesbian Social Square Dance Club, was founded in August 1983 by Ted Oakes who currently teaches the basic classes. Ted had previously danced with The Foggy City Squares in San Francisco and organized eight people at Bronco's Bar in Phoenix. Some of the founding members are Don Wilson and Charlie Reinke, who are still active in DVS, Larry Gunter and Randy Sellars who later formed a group called Midnight Ramblers



The club logo was designed by the fantastic and creative Larry Gunter. The banner was designed by the maaahvelous Ron Erikson and was later remade by Leland Toy. A faaaabulous group of our dancers formed a committee and designed the shirt and badge.

We currently have 50 members dancing from Basic to C1. About 30% of our members are women. We have one gay caller, Seth Levine, who is also the Club President.

In addition to weekly classes at Augustana Lutheran Church and "fun night" at the C Ash Inn, we have quarterly "hoedowns" with guest callers. Our yearly main event is the ever popular and fantastic Swing Thru Arizona fly-in which is held in January on the same weekend as the AGRA Rodeo. The extremely successful 1988 IAGSDC Convention, CROSSTRAILS IN THE DESERT, was held in Phoenix.




PHOENIX, AZ.

Midnight Squares members meet in the Castro on Sunday afternoon for participation in advanced and challenge classes and/ or dance sessions through C-2, with some members also dancing privately at C-3 and C-4. Noted for their devotion to learning



In addition to its devotion to the more complicated aspects of square dancing, the club is also noted for its zealous adherence to a minimalist approach to organization: it operates in accordance with a one-page list of guidelines, the only office established is that of Treasurer, and the various committees consist of those volunteers willing and interested enough to spend time at meetings or performing projects. The club is a Charter Member of the IAGSDC and welcome all advanced and challenge level dancers to join them when visiting San Francisco.



In fact, we have a fly-in coming up October 8-10 of this year. We cordially invite everyone to Chase The Chile which will be held in conjunction with the world famous Albuquerque International Hot Air Balloon Fiesta.



1985 - PROMENADE ALONG THE ROCKIES

T-Squares of Tuscon was founded nine years ago after a visit to Tucson and challenge from Desert Valley Squares in Phoenix. Our active membership is about 14, with several inactive members who drop in and out. Current membership is about 75%

We dance all levels through A-1 every Tuesday evening at Club 2520. Our basic level class which begins every September dances with us on that night. We sponsor an anniversary party in August and a spring fly-in.

The Times Squares began when Mark Davis remembered a barn dance in Indiana that he once attended with his aunt and uncle. He placed an article in the October 1983 Sundance newsletter soliciting others who might be interested in giving the activity a try in the gay and lesbian context. On November 12, 1983, New York's first gay and lesbian square dance was held, quickly followed on January 6, 1984 by a second event.

In the late winter or early spring, the late George Lanyi, a Western Star Dancer, visited New York with news of the greater world of

gay square dancing, and the then-upcoming convention being planned, in April for Seattle. On October 24, 1984, the first beginner class started, involving 19 people. By the class closing night of November 14th, 34 people showed up. Virtually the whole club (32 people) attended the 1985 convention in Denver.

In the spring of 1987, The Times Squares began "invading the straight square dance world," attending the first New Jersey State Square and Round Dance Convention, a tradition the club continues up to the present time. In January of 1989, three dancers timidly ventured out to the January Jubilee to dance as openly gay, same sex couples (it was difficult with only 3), where they were overjoyed to team up with members of the DC Lambda Squares, the Chesapeake Squares, and the Independence Squares to show their stuff. Thus were the beginnings of The Ad Hoc Education and Outreach Committee, who paved the way for openly gay dancers to attend all of the major East coast and Midwest festivals, culminating last year in our first appearance at the National Square Dance Convention.


In 1989, as a culmination of over three years hard work, PEEL THE APPLE, the 6th IAGSDC Convention was hosted by The Times Squares. Our pride in this achievement is

Times Squares is often heralded as the largest gay square dance club. With a membership hovering around 300, we certainly are big. In actuality, we probably alternate having the distinction of being the largest club with SATB.

We have found that dancing as the Times Squares, from mainstream to C-1 club, and to C-3 as individuals, is a wonderful way to make friends, both within and beyond the gay and lesbian community. The club takes seriously its responsibility to encourage the development of talented young callers, and thus provides a scholarship fund to foster attendance at caller schools. Our classes, club nights, social dances, and quarterly special weekends feature noted national callers, the most notable being the Halloween weekend Peel the Pumpkin, provide a wealth of opportunities for New York area dancers and visitors to enjoy themselves.

1986 - STAR THROUGH THE GOLDEN GATE

El Camino Reelers was founded in 1985 by Marilyn Martinyak and Pat Dixon. The club name refers to El Camino Real ("The Royal Highway"), the road leading south from San Francisco, which originated with the early Spanish missionaries and which became the "Main Street" of the towns and cities that flourished along its length. "El Camino Reelers" is therefore an appropriate name for a club that, as legend has it, was founded by two women who wanted a local alternative to the square dance clubs an hour away in San Francisco.

The mission bell which is the club's symbol was inspired by the commemorative bells that were placed at various locations to mark the route of El Camino Real from the Bay Area to the border with Mexico. The current club badges, designed by Katy Carrell, feature a beautifully hand-painted rainbow of squares promenading around the bell.

The Golden State Squares had its origins with a group of people dancing to one of the earliest recipients of The Golden Boot Award, Dave "Happy" New Year. After attending the Denver convention, the club was formed in 1986. Of the founders, only Bill Hartley is still active in the club, though Mark Halley joined shortly thereafter.

Over the years, we have been represented at all the conventions, except the first. We have participated in all of the area Pride Festivals, The Los Angeles Rodeo, given bar exhibitions, and hosted beer bust fund raisers.



We graduated 16 people at plus level this spring and are beginning a new class in July. This has been our most successful year. We are proud to be represented at REMAKE THE CIRCLE. We also invite you to join any Wednesday evening in Costa Mesa, California.

1987 - EXPLODE THE ROSE

The founders were Greg Loe--club instructor until he recently took a hiatus to spend more time with his lover--Stan Boyden, Bill St. John and Art Katz currently still dancing with the club; as well as Joy TeSelle, Corky Bolin, Rick Wiles, Janelle, and Kim Brownlee.

Bill St. John designed the monkey insignia for our banner and badges. We are currently dancing on club night to caller Dick Houlton from Stockton, California. Dick has been calling for more than 40 years and has been a great addition to our weekly program.

We currently have 16 full A level dancers in addition to 15 new members in our A level class. We have 6 members who are women. Class night is Monday, teaching full A; please join us when visiting the Sacramento area.

Tinseltown Squares has been growing, dancing and having fun in the past year. In an extensive outreach program to bring the joys of gay square dancing to Southern California, the club has performed square dance demonstrations wherever we could, including: beer busts at Floyd's in Long Beach and The Rawhide in North Hollywood; with The Golden State Squares at The Orange County Gay Pride Festival on the campus of the University of California, Irvine; The Sunset Junction Street Festival; The "Being Alive" AIDS Support Group Christ-

At each event we had a live caller and when possible, invited the onlookers to dance with us and experience for themselves the joy and camaraderie of square dancing.



West Hollywood, with hundreds of outrageously costumed gay men and lesbians parading themselves through the hunky crowds jamming the street for the annual Halloween Festivities, Tinseltown dancers stopped traffic with two enthusiastic squares mainstreaming at the busy intersection of San Vicente and Santa Monica Boulevards. With one eye on the dancers and one eye on the passing beauties, Paul Waters called the action.


Tinseltown Squares and gay square dancing were the hot topic in a segment featured on I.M.R.U., a weekly, hour long, Sunday night gay and lesbian radio program on KPFK-FM, the Pacifica radio station in L.A. The segment was broadcast in November, 1992. Interviewed on the program were Paul Waters and members Steve Siporin and Craig Peterson, discussing the club, the history of gay square dancing, why each became involved and what pleasure they derive from the activity.

For the last two years, with our club banner flying and Paul marching along and calling, two squares of Tinseltowners promenaded and square danced two and a half miles down West Hollywood's Santa Monica Boulevard to the applause of gays and straights lining the route. The special occasions were The 1992 and 1993 Christopher Street West Gay Pride Day Parade. Oh, happy day! Oh, weary feet!

In the six years and four months since *Tinseltown Squares* was founded, the club has undergone many changes and endured many problems associated with keeping a square dance club flourishing. From the original eleven charter members, the club has grown to sixty-five active members, three associates, and 35 student members.

We have classes two nights a week at the Highland Ebell Clubhouse in the Highland Park section of Los Angeles; mainstream level on Tues.; plus level on Thurs.; and we've had great success with our Annual Star Thru L.A. fly-in, in February, with our Third Saturday Of The Month Club Square Dance and with our newly initiated all-day Pre-Graduation Dance honoring our basic-mainstream class. Other highlights of Tinseltown's social calendar this past year were the "Coming-Out Party" for our class caller Paul Waters (who was he kidding?), our annual White Elephant Gift Christmas Party, our Square Dancing Picnic under the trees in a Pacific Palisades park, and the participation of fourteen Tinseltowners at the March On Washington. Yes, Tinseltown Squares is growing, dancing, having fun and proud to be a member of the IAGSDC!







1988- CROSSTRAILS IN THE DESERT

Chi-Town Squares burst upon the Chicago scene during the summer of 1987. It seems, Ron Goodman, a transplanted Seattle Puddletown Square, and Jerry Cohen, a Chicagoan in search of a gay square dance lifestyle, were introduced at Carol's Speakeasy one C&W night. Both had the same quest--how to start a gay square dance club in Chicago

With the help of Nick Kelly and another ex-Puddletowner, Joel Murdy, Chi-Town Squares became a reality. The club's first class was held on October 27, 1987, and the following May, 36 dancers graduated Mainstream.



Ron Goodman went on to served as the club's first President, and has more recently won Gay Chicago Magazine's "Country Western DJ of the Year" award. Jerry Cohen served on Chi-Town's original Steering Committee, and sadly passed away in 1991.

A few short weeks after that first graduation, 75% of Chi-Town's members travelled to Phoenix to attend the IAGSDC CROSSTRAILS IN THE DESERT Convention. Chicago was now unquestionably hooked on square dancing!

During our second year, the Steering Committee gave way to an elected Board of Directors, and that Halloween saw the virgin appearance of the ever-lovely, even more popular Chi-Town SheDevils. Lil Biddydick, Lotta Reckonwith, LaBella DaBall, and Lyla K. Rugg first gave life to what has become a Chicago phenomena--The SheDevils.

After entertaining our own club for a year or two's worth of parties, The SheDevils grew in number and fame. By the time they had performed at various charitable benefits, several leather contests (yes, leather contests, why they even headlined the last International Mr. Leather Contest), shared the stage with the famous Millie Orchid Show, and hosted Sunday brunches for out-of-town square dancers -- their numbers had swollen, not to mention their

The SheDevils now included Layona Davenport, Lucy Anna Purchase, LoAnne Behold, Lucinda Saddle, Leada Horstawater, Lois Carmen Denominator, Luwanada B. Astarr, L'More L'Merrier, Libby A. Majora, Lynn Guini, Lillian DeValley, Luna Tic, Ludann Lasivious, to name but some of these starlets. To be a SheDevil, one merely needs lots of crinolines, big hair, and an "L" name. Layona and her SheDevil Court captured the Honky Tonk Queen title at the 1990 Vancouver Convention.


Chi-Town Squares membership took a drastic leap in 1989 with 71 new dancers starting classes. This was close on the heels of our very first, very successful fly-in (thank you very much to 34 different cities for making that possible), The Great Chicago Crossfire. This has, of course, become our annual Labor Day event, with each succeeding year attracting more

The Grand River Squares was founded by Chuck Novak as The Nameless Grand Rapids Gay Square Club on February 9, 1988, after attending several conventions, loads of encouragement from other IAGSDC members, and a recovery from the false start of March

We began with seven dancers and danced for two years with less then one square, using ghosts, 3/4 or ½ squares.

The club logo was a one year project, using secret ballot to reduce the number of choices. From there we combined several

ideas and reached a consensus. The badge, T-shirt and banner are copies of the club logo. Club levels include basic and mainstream, one-third of our program also includes country/western line and couple dancing. There are currently six women and 14 men as members.

Our Ropin' The River Fly-In has been held in May 1991, '92, and '93 as well as drive-ins to Cleveland, Chicago, and Toronto.

Always hoping there will be enough for a square. Because of our small numbers and the thousands of times we have lacked enough dancers for mainstream instruction, we consider ourselves "Professional Basic Square Dancers."

Independence Squares was founded by Alan Laufer. In 1988, as a renegade from the Times Squares in New York, he decided it was time that gay and lesbian square dancing debuted in Philadelphia. With the aid of newspaper ads, word-of-mouth, and the assistance of angels that had been misplaced by the Chesapeake Squares, Alan launched Philly's first gay and lesbian square dance class. Meeting in a converted parish house near the University of Pennsylvania, square dancers soon became a regular part of the Monday night crowd in University City, as the sounds of Beautiful, Beautiful Brown Eyes filled the air.



By January of the following year, a second beginners' class had begun. 22, 1989 brand new mainstream dancers descended on NYC to PEEL THE APPLE and the IAGSDC family as the Independence Squares! However, our first graduation celebration would not be held until January of 1990--with Ann Uebelacker calling, I might add. (So, just how long do you think Betsy Ross took to plan HER parties??!)

Our first Board of Directors was elected in September of 1989 and we incorporated in May, 1991. Our very first board began planning a fly-in in 1989 and it arrived on Easter weekend, 1993. (O.K., if Betsy had REALLY taken so long as we do, George would never have gotten his flag and Prince Edward might now be our club caller. Hmmm...) Considering the trio of callers present for the first ever Philadelphia Freedom fly-in, it was well worth the wait. (No, I'm not going to tell you who was there; if you were one of the 200+ dancers present you already know and if you missed it you might roll over and die of disappointment.)

Since our humble beginning in 1989, we've graduated 6 plus classes, 2 advanced classes, and innumerable, but always memorable, mainstream classes. Our current membership is about 50--we export a lot. So, next time you are in the City of Brotherly/ Sisterly Love, drop in on the Independence Squares--but please don't plan as far in advance as we do.




We dance weekly at Trax, a local bar, as this helps us keep the cost down. We have had the same straight couple (Jerry and Joan) calling for us since we started.



High Desert Stars had no bio available





Mike is anticipating another exhilarating experience at the *IAGSDC* Convention in the Great Emerald City of Seattle!




Ed Foote


Ron Libby

Anne Uebelacker



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














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
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
