
The always-exciting, always-entertaining Rich Reel has again agreed to be our class caller. The class per se will begin on October 23.





An Interview with Marilynn Fowler by Dan Smith

D: Your name is?

M: Marilynn Fowler.

D: So Marilynn where were you born?

M: San Francisco.

D: Oh wow! And have you lived here all of your life:

M: Pretty much, yea. I went to Grattan Elementary when I was really little, then to Westmoor High in Daly City. I also have a BA from Berkley in Social Science field major, with emphases in mass communication and Social Psychology.

D: So that's what you do for a living?

M: No I build web pages. I used to work at this company, I call it the evil company; it's the evil place. I was building a data base for them, so they lent me a computer because I didn't have one at home. While using the computer I thought, "Well what's this thing they call the web?" I found free E-mail and a free web site. So I went to this web site and I followed the template. One day I wanted to do something more then what the template offered. Again I thought, "I wonder what would happen if I did this?" and "Oh! It worked, it worked." I went on line, found tutorials and taught myself.

With the web you see right away what you've made. "Well I'll try this, how does that look? Um no; OK change this. OK THAT'S what I want!" I like the challenge of figuring out the Java script. How to get it to work the way I want it. D: How did you happen to hear about square dancing?

M: Through Joe and Todd. They invited me one evening and everyone was having a good time. I also went to Class Completion. Joe and I go way back, we've known each other since 1988 or 1989. I met Todd through Joe when they started going out. In fact I live in Joe's old apartment.

Its fun to say, "Oh let's do gay square dancing. You want to come with us?" I like all the little stylings. A bunch of my friends came to class completion and they loved it. Well, one woman really wasn't in to it but her friend Zach just loved it. We think he'll be coming back and I think my friend Steven might want to square dance and my friend Jon expressed a real interest. I enjoy it because my friends are in it. When I went to the freebie thing (Class) and there was Leigh and Laurie, in addition to Joe and Todd; that sealed the deal.

D: And already you've impressed us by calling two tips.

M: Those were memorized. I didn't ... they're not extemporaneous.

D: They may be memorized but they were executed flawlessly without any nervousness apparent what so ever and without squares breaking down really.

M: Oh! (Marilynn laughs)

D: Do you want to continue with that?

M: I think it would be fun. Part of my history was as a choreographer. I used to be a dancer with a group called Voice Farm and at this club named The Box on Divisidero, we were The Box Dancers.



Joe (Casserly) was also a Voice Farm dancer. He came on probably a year after I did. Then I did some choreography for some shows...

D: Tell us about the shows?

M: My favorite show that I did choreography for was Hillbillies on the Moon, it was a musical and Leigh Crow and Laurie were in it. Leigh was one of the two hillbillies and I was the evil insect queen...Oh! The other show I really liked was Women's Prison Christmas. That was fun although I didn't choreograph it. And my favorite show that I choreographed where I hated the show would be Rocky Horror Superstar. I loved all the people that I met but it was a disaster. But the dancing was flawwwwless, I was really happy.

D: Have you done any other kind of dancing?

M: I tried the Brazilian martial art Capoeria until I got kicked in the head and realized that it was just a little bit beyond me. Then I learned the Cuban couples dance called Danzon. With Danzon you have to listen to the music because there're specific

things you're suppose to be doing depending on what the musicians are playing.

D: You've done a lot of dancing and choreography. Did you go to Rich's Caller Lab several weeks ago? M: Yes. I sucked but it was fun. It was so hard 'cause I had all these people standing there looking at me expectantly and I'm standing there going, "Hummmm..." and they'll be whispering little helpful hints..."Do this." I realized I had no idea what it was I needed to do to get the people back where they need to be. I remembered the stuff Rich told us on how to resolve things but otherwise I had no clue. (Marilynn softly claps her hands together). I like the kaleidoscopic nature of

managing people. I think that Calling would give me that ability to manage a group of people.

D: Have you done any other artistic things? M: Well once I had a fake art show. I knew this woman who had a hair salon slash art gallery. She Ask me, "Want to have an art show?" and I said, "Sure." So I made up all this fake art..."

D: Why is it fake art?

M: Because I'm not an artist. It was just like drawing all this stuff. I did a couple of paintings; I did some collages with stuff I got from the Weekly World News...I cut out "Is your roommate a space alien?" I said I was the daughter of a Senegalese expatriate and a Dutch lesbian or something like that. I gave all my friends, who were coming, lines to say; things you'd hear at a pretentious art gallery, such as

"Oh I think it is terrific, of Mahler."

D: "This reminds me of Vermeer." (We both laugh)

M: Oh I'm a deejay at a radio station, KPOO; Poor Peoples Radio, Monday 9a.m. to noon. I play the blues. I get lots of callers. They're the ones who help me make the show. I also started fencing at the end of 87.

D: Why?

M: Because it's chess with blades. I'm a member of *Halberstadt Fencers Club* which is on 17th and South Van Ness; I fence foil. In foil it's all about right of way and only the torso is the target.

D: Is there anything else that you want to do that you haven't done yet?

M: Oh there's tons of things. I want learn how to weld, hula dance, silkscreen and I want to learn how to play the piano.
