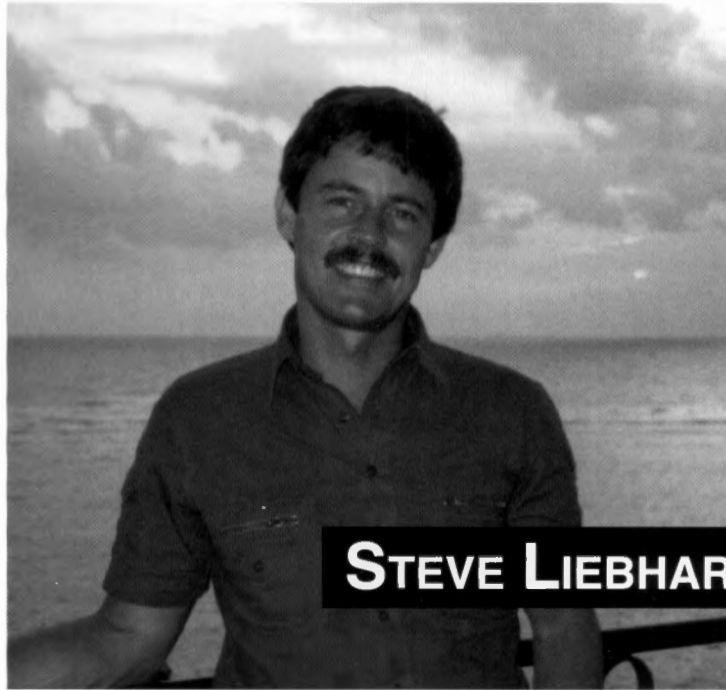

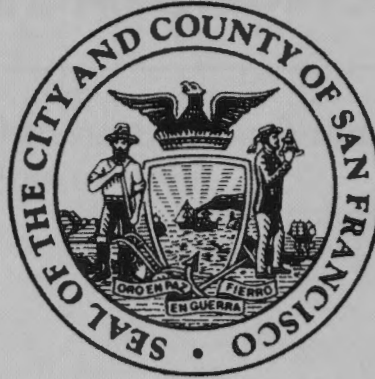


I thank every one of you for your support these past five years and look forward to contributing to the work of the Association in any way I can.

**RAY
BRENDZY**

Ray was born and raised on the West Coast. He began dancing and calling at the early age of seven, and has remained an active participant in the square dance movement ever since. He enjoys calling at all levels from Mainstream through C3, and dances whenever he can. Ray loves singing calls, which is evident by the enthusiasm he puts into them. He is a graduate of the University of British Columbia and specialized in the education field.

Ray may be a familiar face to some, as this is his third IAGSDC convention, and he had called for a number of fly-ins. Wishing all a successful convention and happy dancing!

**SAUNDRA
BRYANT**

Saundra has been behind the square dance microphone since 1979, but her introduction to square dancing came almost twenty years earlier. In 1960, Sandie was inducted into the Hashers Jrs. by her Girl Scout leader Swersie Norris. Five years later the group broke up as the children pursued their educations. In 1978, Sandie returned to square dancing, and within a year was dancing C1 at the National Convention in Milwaukee. When she returned home from that convention, she informed Swersie that she wanted to learn to call.

Under Swersie's tutelage, Sandie worked on her calling skills. In 1980 she attended her first CallerLab in Kansas City, and called at various local festivals before calling at her first National in Detroit in 1982. Her pursuit of calling did not diminish her desire to dance, and she joined Bill Heimann's tape workshop, and to this day still dances one night a week with that group. Sandie is currently an associate staff member of the National Advanced and Challenge Convention, and various festivals and conventions. She has been on several television shows,

**VIC
CEDER**

Vic Ceder hails from Los Olivos in sunny "Southern Central California" as he is fond of calling it. He began square dancing in 1973 at the tender age of 13, and met his wife, Debbie, at lessons. Together, they learned the Advanced and Challenge levels in their high school and college years. During college, Vic developed an interest in calling. He attended tape groups where he and Debbie were learning Challenge, and he began to write choreography to aid in the learning process. Having no calling equipment, Vic would simply walk the dancers through this extra material with no microphone or music. In 1981, he



was offered an opportunity to call a few tips at the Challenge level using a microphone and calling equipment at an informal gathering of the tape group dancers. While Vic would tell you that he had butterflies in his stomach, those who were there say that he sounded like he had been calling all his life. He has a natural rhythm and loves to keep the dancers dancing. Shortly thereafter, he bought his own calling equipment and currently calls at all levels. Square dancing has taken him to Japan four times, to Germany twice, to Denmark and Sweden once each, and all over these wonderful United States. Besides square dancing, Vic enjoys swing dancing, gardening, ragtime piano playing, scuba diving, and French comic books, all of which take a back seat right now because his time is taken up by his 16-month old daughter, Caitlyn.

In 1990 & 1991 Deborah and Frank were the California Chairmen for the Callerlab Foundation for the Promotion and Preservation of Square Dancing. They have instructed many Caller Schools, and in 1995 Deborah received her accreditation as a Callerlab Accredited Caller Coach, the 30th such



caller in the world to achieve such status. Deborah and Frank have led many interest sessions at the Callerlab Conventions and the National Conventions.

Deborah is currently Vice-Chairman of the Caller Training Committee of Callerlab, and began a three year term as a member of the Callerlab Board of Governors in 1995.

Deborah's latest singing call tape, "MY ROAD OF HAPPY DESTINY", was released in late 1995. Deborah is currently a staff recording artist for Hi-Hat Records, with songs titled "Hakuna Matata", "I Fall to Pieces", and "The Color of the Wind".

Andy Shore began dancing with the El Camino Reelers in 1986, and experienced his first IAGSDC® convention in Portland - Explode the Rose in 1987. Andy attended the very first GCA caller school in New York in 1989, where he says he "got

Andy is a member of Callerlab, the Santa Clara Valley Callers Association, and is the outgoing president of the Gay Callers Association. 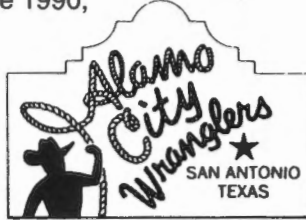

ALAMO CITY WRANGLERS

The Alamo City Wranglers from San Antonio is the first gay square dance club in Texas. The club was founded as a result of a weekend in June 1990, when dancers from IAGSDC® clubs in Baltimore, Albuquerque, Portland, Seattle and Denver joined a few San Antonio dancers in doing bar demonstrations and holding an open house. Caller for the weekend was Bill Eyler, who donated his services. In the months following that weekend, Cricket Matheson, Harland Jylha, and Dave Vanderhoof became founders of the new club.



ACW has graduated Mainstream and Plus classes. The club was represented at the Miami, Albuquerque, Seattle, Washington, D.C., and Chicago conventions. The highlight of our year is our Pass The Alamo fly-in, which always takes place on the last weekend of March, and gives us a chance to meet and dance with members of other clubs. BIG D LONGHORNS (NEW CLUB)

The Big D Longhorns Square Dance Club was founded in September of 1995, and currently has 16 members. We are the only gay and lesbian club in North Texas, the closest IAGSDC® club being the Alamo City Wranglers in San Antonio, about 275 miles south. Our first Basic/Mainstream class began on October 1995 and graduated in February 1996. We currently meet twice a month on Sunday afternoons. We alternate between using recordings and try to have a guest caller once a month.

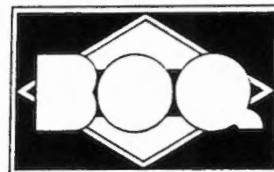

Cream City Squares has a performance team for doing tips at festivals and charity functions associated with the gay/lesbian community.

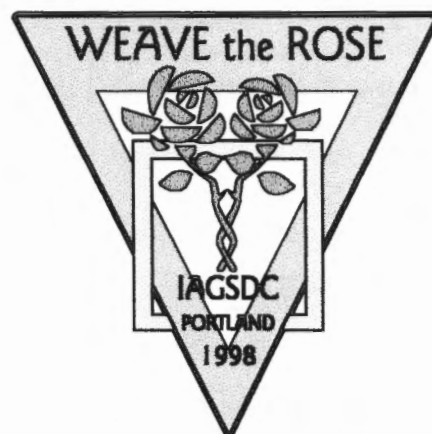

mately only 3% of those who have ever attended a gay convention.

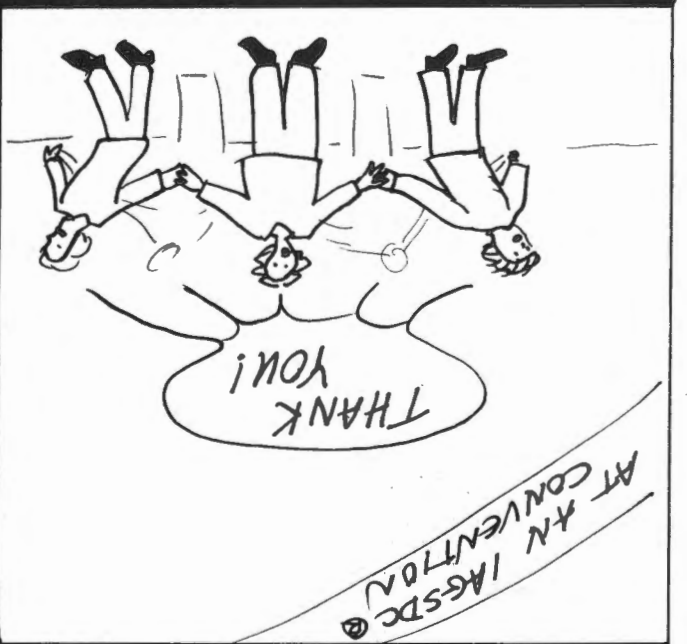
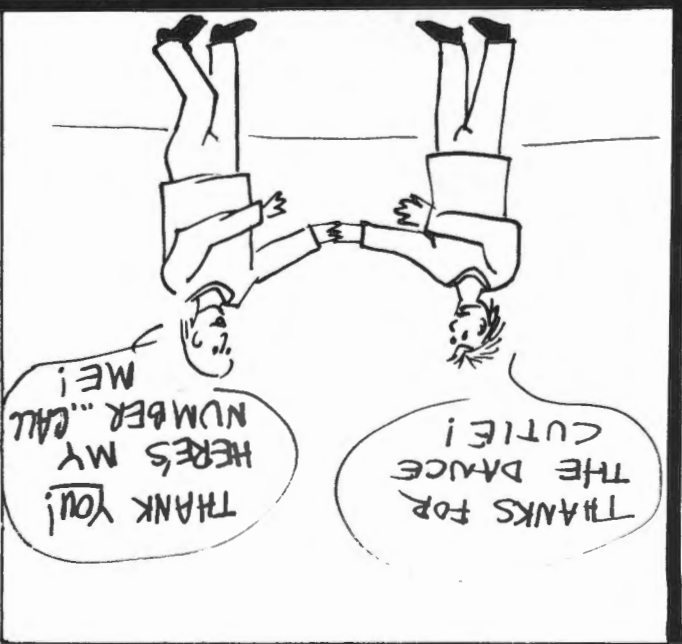
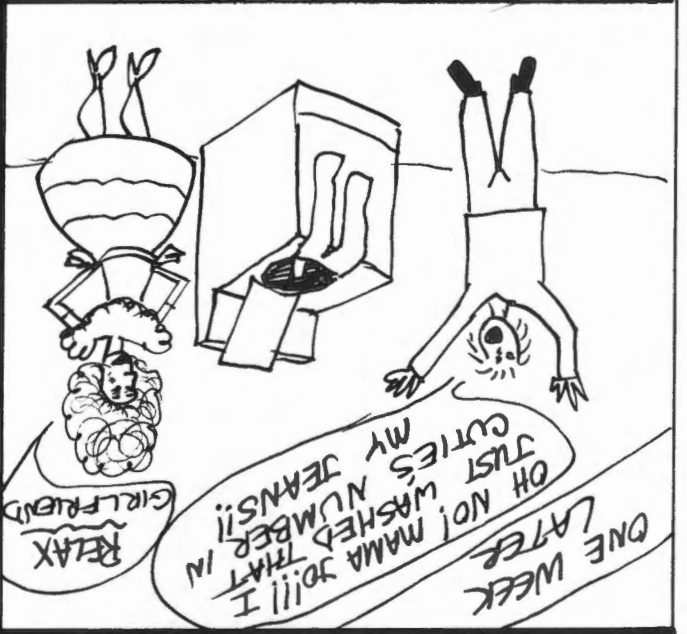
For those of you new to the IAGSDC® Convention scene, the Medallion Dancers project is a program of recognition on the occasion of attending your 10th convention. The purpose of the program is to acknowledge individual commitment to the gay square dance activity. All dancers, non-dancers, callers, and vendors who are registered participants are eligible to receive the specially-cast medallion. Your attendance is tracked through the registration databases, and the conventions do not have to be consecutive.

In order to be eligible in 1996, a dancer would need to have started participating at least at the 4th convention in Portland, Oregon, in 1987. This year's honorees include 2 dancers who attended the first convention at Seattle in 1984; 3 attended the second one at Denver in 1985; and 6 attended the third one at San Francisco in 1986. Think of commitment this way: These Medallion Dancers represent about 1,300 dancer-years of experience.

Each individual's sacrifices to make this commitment are distinct to that person. The range of support at the local level to the gay square dance community is enormous. To tell the story for each person in this article is not possible, but I encourage you to find them at convention and talk about their experiences. They range from Plus to Challenge dancers, full-time callers, instructors, convention chairpersons, and members of Boards of Directors. Some travel long distances to dance on a regular basis; some live just around the corner. Some are lovers; some are friends. One thing is for certain—many of them are friends because they have been doing this "convention thing" for over ten years.

There is a difference in the basis upon which a dancer and a staff caller is able to accumulate convention attendance. A dancer's choice is simply a personal one since no specific dancing proficiency is required for whatever programs you dance. A staff caller must be asked to participate; thus, they must demonstrate a calling proficiency which is anticipated by the dancers. They have achieved their proficiency through many years of commitment to the art of calling and express their commitment to the gay community by accepting the invitations. This year, **Mike DeSisto** is the first staff caller who has been invited to 10 conventions and achieved Medallion Dancer status. He and his wife, Kathy, have become a friend to many dancers in the gay community. Welcome!
